The Sunflower Club At Willamette View

The Sunflower Cub has been a game changer for my spouse. The combination of activities physical, mental, and emotional—has reduced confusion and anxiety, increased her sense of social wellbeing, and brought renewed joy to her daily life.

The Sunflower Club Adult Day program provides stimulating and nurturing care that includes guided activities, art, music, and movement. The Sunflower Club inspires the art of living well by providing an individual with cognitive challenges a safe, compassionate place to spend structured time, and provide relief for their caregiver.

To support the needs of our community, we reached out to Providence Foundation's "Help is Here" team consisting of co-authors Dr. Marian O. Hodges, a practicing geriatrician at Providence Portland Medical Center and Anne P. Hill, a retired lawyer who cared for her mother with Alzheimer's disease, to provide educational sessions to almost five hundred residents, employees, and families. All attendees were provided a copy of the "Help is Here" book for their personal use courtesy of the donors to Blue Heron Foundation.

Our vision for this program is to provide the entire Willamette View community with the knowledge and tools to support the aging mind.

Resident Assistance through the Good Neighbor Fund

In 2021, the Blue Heron Foundation At Willamette View, through the generosity of your neighbors, awarded resident assistance in the amount of \$220,000. These funds helped seven individuals who demonstrated financial need, covering costs related to room and board, Home Care, transportation to medical visits, medical and pharmaceutical charges, and rental of medical equipment. This financial support ensures a safe and comfortable living environment and quality of life for all Willamette View residents when they need it the most.

Assistance from the Blue Heron Foundation tangibly demonstrates Willamette View's commitment, since 1955, in meeting the core tenet of our charitable charter, currently amplified by our mission "To Inspire the Art of Living Well" and vision, "To Transform the Experience of Aging"!

Toward the end, they outlived their savings, and we were so grateful to WV for helping them live the rest of their lives in comfort with the loving support of an incredible staff. 

<u>Green Fund</u>

\$10,968 Green Fund Grants

In 2020, at the request of the Willamette View Green Team, the Blue Heron Foundation established a Green Fund. The purpose is to invite ideas to reduce utility costs and the carbon footprint of our community and support the implementation of sustainability projects.

The Blue Heron Foundation Green Fund is a dynamic fund that strives to enhance the daily practice of helping minimize waste and maximize return on investments throughout the Willamette View Campus. We have experienced support that helped brighten up our perspective in the Manor and Court Workshops. Thank you, Blue Heron Foundation, for your continued support to "INSPIRE THE ART OF LIVING WELL".

Each time the fund balance reaches \$10,000, the Green Team will request project proposals and select projects to implement.

The grant awards for 2021 were as follows:

\$2,793 LED lighting for the Court and Manor shops

- Replaced fluorescent lighting with LED
- Reduced electricity costs by about \$1,300 per year
- Reduced carbon emissions produced by electricity generation
- Eliminated mercury found in fluorescent lights
- Initial investment is paid off in about 1.4 years

\$8,175 Reusable food containers & equipment

- Startup costs to begin a transition from paper to go containers
- Included initial supply of containers and washing & drying racks
- Can be used up to three hundred times, then recycled
- Monthly materials cost savings estimated at \$1,650
- Reduces the WVI carbon footprint



Arts and Crafts Sale to Benefit artworks

In December, the Blue Heron Foundation, in partnership with a talented group of artists, hosted an arts and crafts sale to benefit the artworks program. Over 30 artists participated, selling 900+ items, raising \$5,020 to help support creativity and therapy through art.

Resident Council Funding

In 2019, the Blue Heron Foundation Committee formed a workgroup tasked with shifting funding for Council-approved resident activities from Willamette View, Inc. operating support to philanthropic support.

As a result, in 2021 the Blue Heron Foundation awarded grants to cover costs for the Libraries and Art in Public Areas half of the Chorus Director salary, as well as matching grant for donations received from Garden Committee plant sales, Movies, Music, MusicWorks, Public Affairs and Vespers.

Community Stores

A common comment from Pantry users is, "I don't know what I would do without the Pantry." The Pantry provides personal care products, overthe-counter drugs and vitamins, office supplies, and snacks. The list could go on, of course, but for many of our residents, shopping at off-campus stores for these things simply isn't possible.

And the Pantry volunteers are always there, serving customers, restocking shelves, handling our banking and charge slips, scheduling volunteers and shopping for the items we sell. Volunteers keep the Pantry going - and their service is indispensable. What struck me about working in the Carousel is what a natural "meeting space" it is for residents! Not to mention finding small treasures for that last minute birthday gift or hostess gift! The Carousel became a "destination" on walks in the building. Many people would go by several times to look at the windows—truly a source of entertainment and interest. Residents and staff have often found that one clothing or accessory item they needed at the last minute at good prices.
